

7th Military World Games unveil emblem, mascot, and slogan

At a special press conference held in Wuhan on November 24, the Ministry of National Defense of the People's Republic of China formally unveiled the emblem, mascot and slogan of the 7th Military World Games (MWG), released the official website, and announced that the 7th MWG will be staged from October 18 to October 27 in 2019.

The International Military Sports Council (CISM) officially announced on May 21, 2015 during the 70th General Assembly that China will be the host country of the 7th MWG, with Wuhan, Hubei Province the host city.

The organizing committee for

the games was set up in Beijing on January 1, 2017, followed by the establishment of the executive committee on July 5 in Wuhan.

The emblem of the MWG is composed of seven five-pointed stars and a red ribbon organized in the pattern of the number 7. The emblem has been called the "bond of peace and friendship," conveying the philosophy of peaceful development that China will present to the international community through the games.

The mascot of the games is called Bing Bing. It is based on the image of the Chinese sturgeon, one of China's first-class protected wild animals and known as the "panda in the

water" and the "living fossil in the water."

The slogan, "Military Glory World Peace," fully reflects the CISM's aim of "enhancing friendship through sports" and conveys the common aspiration of "sharing friendship and pursuing peace" held by the contestants from China and other countries in the world.

The Chinese sturgeon, one of China's first-class protected wild animals, is a migratory fish species living mainly in the Yangtze River basin. It has a sharp, angular shape. It dwells in areas along the eastern coasts of China. Upon reaching maturity, they migrate upstream to propagate. The Chinese sturgeon is a rare species with a long history.
